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#### CR-05 - Goals and Outcomes

#### Progress the jurisdiction has made in carrying out its strategic plan and its action plan. 91.520(a)

Program year 2022 subrecipients utilized CDBG program funding and other community resources, aligning with our overall goals. Our goals are intended to be concise and transparent while also adhering to community needs. The El Paso County Economic Development Department continues to provide support to its various returning subrecipients while also providing guidance for new/first-time applicants. The thirteen activities listed below support EPC CDBG initiatives for low-to-moderate income (LMI) households and individuals:

- Brothers Redevelopment provided eligible LMI residents within El Paso County access to free Housing Rehabilitation. The Housing Rehabilitation program focuses on barrier removal, as well as emergency rehabilitation for at-risk individuals. 10 LMI households were served.
- The Town of Calhan used funding to install ADA-compliant playground equipment, providing ADA-accessibility to all. 1845 LMI clients were served.
- The City of Fountain completed curb, ramp, gutter, and sidewalk installations to ADA guidelines. 1050 unduplicated LMI clients were served.
- The City of Manitou Springs completed curb, ramp, gutter, and sidewalk installations following ADA guidelines. 1210 unduplicated LMI clients were served.
- The Town of Monument provided curb, ramp, gutter, and sidewalk installations along Beacon Lite Road and SH 105 following ADA guidelines. 3715 unduplicated LMI clients were served.
- El Paso County Community Services Department (Parks) provided ADA improvements along 1,015 feet of Crews Gulch Regional Trail within Widefield Community Park. 825 unduplicated LMI clients were served.
- The Manitou Art Center's Workforce Training Program provided eligible LMI residents within El Paso County with free vocational training, programming, equipment, and workspace utilization to refine a dedicated project/skill. 20 unduplicated LMI clients were served.
- The Place provided emergency housing for at-risk LMI youth aged 15-24 experiencing homelessness. Additionally, their programming provided at-risk youth with job skills training, education, counseling, and food support. 43 unduplicated LMI clients were served.
- Tri-Lakes Cares provided eligible LMI residents with emergency Housing & Utilities assistance for those at-risk of being evicted or having services shut off. 51 unduplicated LMI households were served.
- Mt. Carmel Veteran's Climb provided eligible LMI residents and families facing homelessness with case management, employment assistance, vocational/educational training as well as wraparound services. 146 unduplicated LMI clients were served.
- Envida provided transportation services to eligible LMI Senior residents throughout El Paso County. 1430 LMI clients were served.
- Bring It Home, Inc. provided services at Freedom Springs, a 50-unit supportive housing community. These services catered to LMI Veteran residents who had been experiencing homelessness. 96 unduplicated LMH were served.
- Archway Housing & Services provided eligible LMI residents with food pantry access throughout El Paso County. 688 unduplicated LMI clients were served.

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# Assess how the jurisdiction's use of funds, particularly CDBG, addresses the priorities and specific objectives identified in the plan, giving special attention to the highest priority activities identified.

All activities from PY 2022 continue to progress or are now ending, with all public facility/infrastructure projects under construction or in the process of securing a contractor to begin. Due to the harsh winters in Colorado, the public facility/infrastructure projects typically wait until late winter or early spring to release requests for proposals for their projects so they can begin construction in late spring. The 2022 activities include specific priorities and objectives which directly align to the 2022-2026 Consolidated Plan goals:

- Housing Goal H1: Envida facilitated transportation for 1430 seniors, youth, and/or special needs persons in rural El Paso County allowing them access to vital services.
- Housing Goal H2: Brothers Redevelopment assisted 10 eligible homeowners with rehab that focused on removing accessibility barriers or fixing items that posed a direct threat to health and safety.
- Housing Goal H3: El Paso County Economic Development staff facilitated 2 Fair Housing events in 2022.
- Homelessness Goal HM1: Mt. Carmel Veterans Service Center provided intensive case management, employment
  opportunities, and vocational education to 146 veterans to prevent homelessness. Tri-Lakes Cares provided emergency
  services for rent and/or utilities for 51 families in need to keep them housed. The Place provided emergency shelter services
  and ongoing care for 43 rural youth who had experienced homelessness to assist them in leaving the dangers of street life
  and reunite with families.
- Special Needs Goal SN2: City of Fountain built ADA sidewalks, curbs, and gutters in a qualified census tract block group for their 1050 residents. City of Manitou Springs built ADA sidewalks in a qualified census tract block for their 1210 residents. Town of Monument addressed ADA accessibility issues along Beacon Lite Road for their 3715 residents.
- Special Needs Goal SN3: Archway Housing and Services provided support and supplementary food for 688 people through a food bank program. Bring It Home, Inc. provided supportive services to 96 veterans to include transportation, support groups, nutritional training, and training in personal hygiene and self-care.
- Community Development Goal CD2: El Paso County Community Services Department improved Crews Gulch Regional Trail Paving in a qualified census tract block group for 825 residents. Town of Calhan replaced playground equipment and surfacing to be ADA compliant and accessible for their 1845 residents.
- Community Development Goal CD3: Manitou Arts Center provided free access, programming, and equipment for 20 persons for one year.

#### **Narrative**

During PY-2022, CDBG funds were allocated to thirteen different activities providing racial/ethnic background data. In addition to the numbers reported above, 99 individuals identified as 'Other or Multi-racial,' while another 1463 individuals 'refused/chose not to respond.' In total, 2427 individuals were reportedly assisted through these programs.

#### **Narrative**

Please note that the dollar amount expended also includes expenditures from projects allocated in prior program years. Several of our larger-scale infrastructure projects were not completed until PY 2022 began. Typically, our larger-scale infrastructure projects wait until the project is finished to draw down their funding in a single lump-sum, to incentivize construction to be completed to the full scope of the original project. This also allows our program to ensure all federal requirements, including the use of Davis-Bacon wages, to be in full compliance prior to drawing down funds from IDIS.

#### **Narrative**

Outlined within the 2022-2026 Consolidated Plan, El Paso County's CDBG program has no target areas for several reasons. During deliberations of the Community Development Advisory Board, a determination was made to allocate funding across 'areas of need' within El Paso County rather than focus an entire year's funding exclusively on one geographic area of entitlement. This is accomplished by reviewing construction and rehabilitation opportunities in economically distressed areas. This approach allows for multi-year projects in areas such as Fountain or Security-Widefield to be accomplished over multiple funding years. This typically results in a more holistic approach to community development while also increasing support from residents and local agencies. Typically, projects aimed at improving low-to-moderate income geographic areas are given priority over other goals.

#### Leveraging

Explain how federal funds leveraged additional resources (private, state and local funds), including a description of how matching requirements were satisfied, as well as how any publicly owned land or property located within the jurisdiction that were used to address the needs identified in the plan.

While not a requirement of the program, projects receiving funds administered by the El Paso County CDBG program have experienced success in leveraging local funding, project design/oversight, and in-kind labor. Below are leveraging examples from the 2022 program year:

- Envida leveraged \$65,467 in matching funds for their Access to Health Services for Rural Seniors program, ensuring that the program can expand to its projected capacity needs. (Public Service)
- Brothers Redevelopment leveraged approximately \$26,000 in matching funds to assist in covering associable costs for their owner-occupied housing rehabilitation program. (Housing)
- Mt Carmel leveraged \$87,500 in matching funds for their Veterans Climb program, helping to ensure that homelessness is



brief and non-recurring amongst EPC Veterans and their families. (Public Service)

- Tri-Lakes Cares leveraged \$102,695.07 in matching funds for their Housing & Utilities Assistance program, providing relief to families in the form of subsidy payments for rent/utilities. (Public Service)
- El Paso County Community Services leveraged \$10,000 in-kind funds to help create ADA-accessibility pathways within Widefield park. (Public Facilities)
- The Town of Calhan leveraged \$9,000 in matching funds to help provide ADA-accessibility pathways at their municipal playground. (Public Facilities)
- The City of Fountain leveraged \$12,957.40 in-kind labor for design & oversight, helping grant ADA-accessibility pathways along Bonita drive. (Infrastructure)
- The Town of Monument leveraged \$9,030 in matching funds to help provide ADA-accessibility pathways at Beacon Lite Rd. (Infrastructure)

Final leveraging numbers are provided at project closeout in IDIS. At this time the El Paso County Economic Development Department does not have access to any publicly owned land within the jurisdiction that could be used to address the needs identified in the plan, outside of the public rights-of-way that are used in the construction of ADA sidewalks and drainages.

#### Discuss the difference between goals and outcomes and problems encountered in meeting these goals.

Work on all CDBG funded projects for 2022 is still underway, so numbers are still formative. Final numbers will be reported in IDIS. While we work to engage as many organizations as possible to support new and evolving programs, there is no way to guarantee that every Consolidated Plan goal will align to an organization each year. For example, in 2022 we did not fund any organizations that provided special-needs households with affordable housing. We hope continued outreach and technical support will increase the populations served in future years. Our work with Tri-Lakes Cares continues to serve our community, especially after the COVID-19 pandemic. They were able to assist over five times the number of households that were anticipated in the Consolidated Plan due to the number of families still living on the brink of housing instability. There is still an increased need for rent and utility assistance throughout the county.

#### Discuss how these outcomes will impact future annual action plans.

Continued local success and demand of our Housing Rehabilitation Program with Brothers Redevelopment are indicative of a market that still lacks affordable and accessible units for seniors and persons with disabilities. We see requests from households that live in unsafe conditions because life events prevent being able to afford the repairs themselves. The popularity of this program indicates that residents want to own homes and continue to own their homes, even if the result is substandard living. In future years, our program will continue to seek opportunities for low to moderate income residents to improve their living conditions. Subsistence payment programs also continue to be well-received by the community, particularly as housing prices in



the region increase. Safety nets specialized for areas outside the City of Colorado Springs are rare, if not almost unknown. Our assistance programs, such as our current partnership with Tri-Lakes Cares, allow residents of the more outlying communities access to funding that is not as competitive as funding focused on Colorado Springs. Our program will continue to seek out opportunities for holistic approaches to housing stability and resiliency for low to moderate income persons such as our current programming with the Mt. Carmel Veteran's Center. Sustainable pathways out of difficult economic situations will also continue to be a focus.

#### **Narrative Information**

Many activities receiving CDBG funding have made significant improvements to low-to-moderate income families' lives, such as the installation of a new furnace so the family has heating in the winter or ADA bathroom improvements so disabled persons can safely shower by themselves. Even the more temporary services, such as one-time rent or utility assistance, typically come with wrap-around services to help the family begin a path to financial resiliency and long-term homeless prevention. Outside of the CDBG program, the El Paso County Housing Authority had a very successful year in addressing affordable housing concerns in the region. In 2022, \$300,000 was loaned to projects to create 128 affordable housing units. Additionally, Private Activity Bonds were issued to create another 133 units of workforce housing. The El Paso County CDBG program continues to enjoy a collaborative partnership with the El Paso County Housing Authority, where the two respective programs play to their own strengths while also providing ongoing feedback and data to each other, which assists with a holistic approach to meeting housing needs in the region.



#### CR-25 - Homeless and Other Special Needs 91.220(d, e); 91.320(d, e); 91.520(c)

Evaluate the jurisdiction's progress in meeting its specific objectives for reducing and ending homelessness through:

#### Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The El Paso County CDBG Program continues to support homeless outreach and homelessness prevention. However, our program does not typically receive a large volume of homeless-related applications. A contributing factor to this is the nature of the program as well as services offered within the region. Most homeless assistance providers are located within Colorado Springs, and the majority of people needing assistance remain within the city as well to be close to the providers. As our funds cannot be used to serve those clients, our efforts are limited to providers who are willing to adjust their client intake process and increase outreach to outlying communities. An example of this is the El Paso County CDBG program's partnership with a service provider called The Place for outreach to homeless youth, 15-24 years of age. Along with outreach, The Place provides shelter, medical and mental health services, employment and education support, and other services to make their clients' homelessness brief and nonrecurring.

#### Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

Homelessness continues to be an ever-present issue within the County, as resource providers are typically situated within the City of Colorado Springs. Since the COVID pandemic, coupled with the rising cost-of-living, the demand for emergency/transitional housing services continues to be on the rise. While services remain limited, the El Paso County CDBG program continues to support programs that specialize in emergency and transitional housing. Additionally, with the presence of several military installations within the County, EPC CDBG has found community support for programs that specifically serve Veterans. An example of such support is highlighted through our continued partnership with the Mt. Carmel Veteran Service Center. Using CDBG funds, Mt. Carmel provides transitional housing services, emergency relief, and job assistance training to Veterans and their families through their Veterans Climb program. Feedback from Mt. Carmel, as well as similar programs, highlights how their growth is often stymied by the limitations of the Public Service allocation cap.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

With the presence of several military installations within the County, EPC CDBG has found community support for programs that are specifically catered to serve Veterans. Long-time partner of the El Paso County CDBG program, Bring It Home Inc., provides services at an affordable housing development for formerly homeless veterans. These services include individual/group counseling, nutrition training, personal hygiene and self-care, crisis intervention, and educational/physical evaluations. This program seeks to stabilize the living situations for veterans and help them transition to independent living. Mt. Carmel Veterans Service Center, another partner agency, was created to prevent homelessness for the most at-risk veterans by providing intensive care management, employment assistance, and vocational training. This is a safety net for Veterans so they, and their families, may avoid experiencing homelessness long-term. The Place, another partner agency, provides education and employment assistance as well as substance abuse and mental health counseling to help their clients move into permanent housing. Our CDBG partnership with Archway Housing & Services supplements their Food Bank program - which provides free access to nutrient-dense food, ensuring that disadvantaged EPC residents receive nutritious, healthy food. The El Paso County CDBG Program continues to work with the Pikes Peak Continuum of Care to find new programs and assistance providers that are working in more rural locations. We intend to work with these agencies throughout 2023.



Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

El Paso County uses two methods to help low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless: 1) provide affordable units for them to live in, and 2) provide assistance and services through local partnerships to support homeless or at-risk households including those discharged from publicly funded institutions of care. By working with developers like Greccio Housing and the Colorado Springs Housing Authority and funders like the El Paso County Housing Authority, we can increase the number of units provided to extremely low-income households. The El Paso County CDBG program also partners with several organizations to provide resources to various groups at risk for homelessness and those seeking a home after time spent at institutions of care. Mt. Carmel Veterans Center works with the local veteran population, providing not only housing but also offering educational programs, case management, mental health services, and employment training. The Place provides shelter and mental health services to homeless youth who may have been recipients of social services or correctional programs in the larger community. Tri-Lakes Cares and Catholic Charities are partners who assist families in danger of losing their home and/or who would otherwise become homeless. Many of the veterans, youth, and families helped by these partnerships also receive assistance from public or private agencies.





#### CR-30 - Public Housing 91.220(h); 91.320(j)

#### Actions taken to address the needs of public housing

The only housing authority that receives funding from the El Paso County CDBG program regularly is the Calhan Housing Authority, which houses seniors and persons with disabilities. They did not request funding in 2022.

# Actions taken to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

The residents at the Calhan Housing Authority have not expressed an interest in homeownership at this time, most likely due to their age and living on a fixed income. The Executive Director of the Calhan Housing Authority, Ashley Deanne, has communicated that these public housing residents take an active part in the decision-making process of the housing authority, and there is an open line of communication between housing authority staff and residents.

#### Actions taken to provide assistance to troubled PHAs

Currently, no housing authority in El Paso County is designated as troubled.





#### CR-35 - Other Actions 91.220(j)-(k); 91.320(i)-(j)

Actions taken to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment. 91.220 (j); 91.320 (i)

Unfortunately, local governments do not have the ability to remove/control market forces or eliminate social perceptions that act as barriers to affordable housing. Local governments can lead by example in reforming public policies and regulations that serve as barriers. Some examples include:

- Creating a streamlined permitting system to make reviews more user-friendly without diminishing environmental, public health, or safety standards
- Adopting an expedited system to process permits for affordable housing projects
- Supporting programs that provide fair housing education and services

Currently, the El Paso County CDBG program provides in-house semi-annual Fair Housing events throughout the County. The content of these Fair Housing events is derived from the needs identified in our Assessment of Fair Housing. These events are designed to make safe, accessible, and affordable housing easier for residents to obtain through education and empowerment. The El Paso County CDBG program has also uploaded Fair Housing resources and materials to the website, directing attention to the information through the events and notices tab. For more information, please see Appendix B.

Fair Housing events are held within El Paso County by Economic Development staff on a semiannual basis. These events typically center around a presentation by staff to discuss current Fair Housing issues and provide contacts for attendees to reach out to, should they come upon potential housing discrimination. The events take place virtually and in person. There is also a rural focus for the in-person sessions. When possible, staff travels outside of the City of Colorado Springs to the municipalities within its jurisdiction to give presentations. The senior center in Fountain or the Calhan Town Hall are two examples of locations where these presentations have previously taken place. The first Fair Housing action to take place in 2022 was an email sent out about Fair Housing Month in April. This email included information about Renters Rights and how to contact agencies for Fair Housing complaints. The EPC Economic Development website was revised to include this information as well. The second Fair Housing event was a webinar held in September where the basics of Fair Housing were covered with several members of the community. Public communication for both events went out to all community partners including those in rural communities.

#### Actions taken to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

A primary obstacle that continues to be identified for addressing underserved needs is a lack of homelessness nonprofit agencies' willingness to apply for CDBG funding. Tracking and reporting expectations continue to be a barrier for most nonprofits in this area. Currently, our program is working with The Place, which serves homeless youth. They can undertake tracking expectations of the program but struggle with how to best address the needs of rural homeless individuals. Our program continues to have discussions with other rural area stakeholders - refining national-level best practices for ending rural homelessness. Other underserved needs that continue to see progress include addressing the needs of elderly individuals so they can age in place within their homes. Brothers Redevelopment does an excellent job of addressing this issue as well as assisting disabled persons with ways to retrofit their homes to best suit their needs. Requests for homeowner rehabilitation continue to be a community need that requires ongoing funding commitments, ensuring needs are addressed as they arise.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, seniors were severely underserved as a majority were at great risk from the effects of the pandemic. Fortunately, Silver Key Senior Services stepped up to the challenge and immensely increased their scope of work and services. Additional funding was provided for the rural transportation program, and it continues to be successful and popular among eligible seniors, particularly those living in rural areas. Additionally, our nutrition assistance program provided several thousand meals for hundreds of EPC seniors, until its conclusion in 2022. Continuation of these services proves to be both a popular request, as well as a logistical challenge for EPC CDBG. Most of our applications are specific to Public Service, but allocatable funds are limited by a 15% budgetary allocation cap. With recommendations from our CDAB, EPC has taken the approach of funding as many viable Public Service-related projects as possible with minimal funding.



#### Actions taken to reduce lead-based paint hazards. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

Brothers Redevelopment continues to run the Homeowner Rehabilitation program offered through El Paso County CDBG funding. This program provides lead-based paint abatement as warranted or needed, depending on the house they are rehabbing and the presence of lead-based paint. An ideal aspect of this program is that it helps those who are the least capable of handling lead-based paint abatement work. This also allows our program to address other health and safety issues within the home, particularly for persons with disabilities. El Paso County CDBG staff also participates in environmental training provided by HUD Region VIII, including any training related to lead-based paint. Training(s) on the HUD exchange are undertaken as well. These resources have been shared with Randi Davis, the Housing Analyst serving the El Paso County Housing Authority, so that she may be aware of new opportunities to address lead-based paint hazards within El Paso County.

#### Actions taken to reduce the number of poverty-level families. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

With increased cost-of-living expenses within the County, individuals continue to look to EPC CDBG-funded programs to provide short-term relief and long-term sustainability. In 2022, several activities started previously as Public Service allocations continued to support families with employment training. Such activities include:

- Mt. Carmel Veterans Center, Veterans Climb, and Employment Transition Programs Veterans Climb has a proven history of providing significant help to veterans and their families. The employment transition program is focused on assisting active-duty military and their spouses find meaningful employment after separation from the military. The Mt. Carmel Veterans Center offers this opportunity directly on local military bases through a partnership with those installations.
- Manitou Art Center, Workforce Training Program This innovative program provides low-to-moderate income individuals
  with opportunities to develop and hone their unique skill sets, providing resource material to grow and expand their own
  online businesses while also providing participants with direct funds, job skills training, and lasting sustainability through selfsufficiency.
- Bring It Home, Inc., provides services at Freedom Springs, a 50-unit supportive housing community dedicated to providing permanent housing to formerly homeless Veterans. Additionally, they provide on-site employment services (job coaching, job placement, education, job skills development training) to help Veterans find long-term sustainable living situations.

#### Actions taken to develop institutional structure. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

El Paso County's housing and community development strategies are implemented by a variety of public, private, and non-profit organizations. Overall, there is good coordination and little duplication of services locally in part because the participating jurisdictions are mostly small communities. The local nonprofit infrastructure is diverse and active in the community. In the wake of COVID-19, this coordination became apparent as many agencies worked to create a referral system amongst themselves to ensure residents in need have multiple sources of assistance and are aware of their options. The El Paso County CDBG program provided Colorado Springs Utilities with a list of participating agencies in utility assistance programs. Additionally, our staff participated in the Housing Domain/Innovations in Aging monthly calls to ensure as many nonprofits as possible are aware of our assistance and programs. Randi Davis, the Housing Analyst for El Paso County, has expanded the initiative to create a housing resources webpage as a one-stop-shop list of all resources available within the community. Additionally, CDBG staff assisted with this effort, and the site has been shared widely among stakeholders. As the number of resources on the site continues to grow, the frequency of the page's use grows as well. To ensure consistent citizen participation and community engagement in our plans, the El Paso County CDBG program has a volunteer board called the Community Development Advisory Board. This board includes representation from participating municipalities, as well as volunteers from the commissioner districts. This board is an integral part of our program's process throughout the year, recommending specific applications and activities for the El Paso County Board of County Commissioners and reviewing Consolidated Plan progress to recommend priority goals. They make it possible for our program to have continued citizen input throughout the year, rather than just at specified comment periods.

# Actions taken to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

CDBG staff is accountable for the necessary coordination and communication to identify community needs and manage the CDBG program according to county priorities. It is essential that staff coordinate with other agencies to implement, enhance, and bring success to the county's CDBG program. To enhance overall coordination, CDBG staff continue consultations throughout the year, opening lines of communication, and attending meetings to enrich the program. While all funds are allocated according

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to federal, state, and local program requirements, ongoing dialogue with agencies, advisory committees, subrecipients, and the general public ensure the accomplishment of goals, objectives, strategies, and priorities. These approaches help to ensure that the our plan is on track and priorities are adjusted as needed. El Paso County CDBG staff continue to participate in local stakeholder meetings including the Housing Domain meetings hosted by the Pikes Peak Area Council on Aging. These meetings are an invaluable resource for sharing important information while also receiving feedback from the community. One of the local organizations that led the charge of coordinated affordable housing measures is the Pikes Peak Housing Network. Their mission is to be the voice and action entity for attainable workforce housing in El Paso County. They seek to unify residents and organizations who want to advocate for, increase, and maintain the supply of affordable units. Their goals are to coordinate all housing affordability activities across the county, introduce relationships between parties with land and parties able to finance/develop that land for affordable housing projects, and educate the community about housing affordability practices. El Paso County Economic Development staff has a seat on the Network's Leadership Council and has provided insight and expertise where needed.

# Identify actions taken to overcome the effects of any impediments identified in the jurisdictions analysis of impediments to fair housing choice. 91.520(a)

The El Paso County's Assessment of Fair Housing was accepted in December 2022 and as such the county currently operates under the Assessment of Fair Housing, not the Analysis of Impediments.

After much consideration and evaluation, in 2022, EPC restructured their Assessment of Fair Housing Goals to be more in line with Needs Assessment, Market Analysis and the Strategic Plan of the 2022-2026 Consolidated Plan. The resulting restructure consolidated three new ConPlan goals specific to Fair Housing:

- H1: Improve access to transportation services and infrastructure, remove impediments to mobility and increase access to opportunities
- H2: Rehabilitation of pre-existing housing inventory to increase affordable, accessible housing choices
- H3: Increase of fair housing education, outreach, and enforcement.

Like previous years' Fair Housing goals, applicants who meet one of these three goals are given priority. Currently, the El Paso County region lacks a cohesive local resource for fair housing education (H3), in comparison to the Denver Metro area, which has the Denver Metro Fair Housing Center. In response to this lack of local educational opportunities, the El Paso County CDBG program hosts free fair housing events at various locations throughout the region twice a year. The content of these fair housing events is derived from the needs identified in our Assessment of Fair Housing. These events are designed to make safe, accessible, and affordable housing easier for residents to obtain through education and empowerment. Additionally, CDBG staff regularly attend fair housing training via webinars and in-person training as available to ensure our information is up to date. We also accept questions from the public regarding fair housing and refer them to resources, such as Colorado Housing Connects and the HUD fair housing hotline.

# Describe the standards and procedures used to monitor activities carried out in furtherance of the plan and used to ensure long-term compliance with requirements of the programs involved, including minority business outreach and the comprehensive planning requirements.

The El Paso County CDBG program monitors the expenditure of CDBG funds using detailed contracts, onsite monitoring, regular evaluations, and reports - sometimes referred to as desk monitoring. For each activity funded, the County and subrecipients enter into an attorney-reviewed contract describing scope of work, budget, and reporting requirements. The contract also indicates the level and type of monitoring to be expected and federal requirements for anti-discrimination and fair housing law. CDBG staff is responsible for ensuring that subrecipients and contractors comply with all pertinent regulations and requirements governing their administrative, financial, and programmatic operations. To ensure compliance, the program engages in report monitoring (quarterly reports, reimbursement requests, and project closeout reports), on-site monitoring (in-person visits and meetings to offices and job sites), and annual risk assessments. Report/desk monitoring occurs at least once per quarter where CDBG staff review the programmatic and financial aspects of the subrecipient activities. Subrecipients are required to submit reports as directed by the contract. The specific details of each activity's quarterly progress are then reported in the IDIS progress open text box. CDBG staff then review the progress of each activity and determine if additional backup documentation is needed.

In-person monitoring and site visits occur as needed. One of the most common reasons for a site visit is to ensure compliance with labor standards and Davis-Bacon requirements. Other reasons could include follow-ups for risk assessments, environmental review site visits or mitigation, and meeting new staff members. To increase outreach to small businesses and contractors, CDBG staff maintains a strong working relationship with the Pikes Peak Small Business Development Center (SBDC) who has frequent, daily interaction with small and minority-owned businesses. Sharing information and contacts, as well as attending minority-focused events hosted by the SBDC, have been our primary methods of minority business outreach. The El Paso County CDBG program anticipates that future events hosted by the SBDC or the Colorado Springs Hispanic Business Council will offer more opportunities to share information, improve understanding of federally funded contracts and the corresponding expectations, and assistance with attaining Federal/State certifications. Our program also maintains a working relationship with the Colorado Procurement Technical Assistance Center (PTAC), which helps businesses interested in working with the government. We have provided their local office with Section 3 resources to help them encourage prospective contractors to apply for the certification. Our hope is that our efforts will increase the number of contractors with Section 3 certification in the Colorado Springs metro area on HUD's listing moving forward.

# Citizen Participation Plan 91.105(d); 91.115(d) – Description of the efforts to provide citizens with reasonable notice and an opportunity to comment on performance reports.

In accordance with the Citizen Participation Plan approved alongside our 2022-2026 Consolidated Plan, residents are provided opportunities to comment on performance reports in a variety of ways and in multiple locations. There is a 15-day comment period prior to submitting the CAPER, allowing citizens and local agencies to submit comments. The outreach of this comment period includes multiple pathways of communication:

- A public notice of comment period was published in the Colorado Springs Gazette on May 15, 2023. Notice was published in both English and Spanish.
- The 15-day CAPER Comment Period ran from May 19, 2023, through June 5, 2023.
- A copy of the CAPER was uploaded in a screen-readable PDF format on our website.
- A hard copy of the CAPER was displayed in the front office of the El Paso County Economic Development Department for interested parties to review the draft or leave a comment.

Whenever a public meeting or comment period is hosted, the El Paso County CDBG program follows a proven, standardized procedure of notice. Notices are always posted on our El Paso County Economic Development website, and whenever hosting events that include public comment, we have paid for publication with the Colorado Springs Gazette. In addition to these procedures, we also provide notice through the Colorado Sunshine Law, which requires notice to be provided to the General Public for any public events allowing public comment and observation.

In 2022, El Paso County restructured the previous fourteen goals into ten streamlined goals. These ten goals are broken up by three objectives: Housing, Homelessness & Special Needs, and Community Development. These goals are as follows: Housing:

- H1: improve access to transportation services and infrastructure, remove impediments to mobility and increase access to opportunities
- H2: Rehabilitation of pre-existing housing inventory to increase affordable, accessible housing choices
- H3: increase fair housing education, outreach, and enforcement

#### Homelessness & Special Needs:

- HM1: Assist in ensuring that homelessness is brief, rare and non-recurring
- SN1: Help special needs residents obtain housing and remain housed while living independently as they choose
- SN2: Reduce accessibility barriers (ADA compliance)
- SN3: Provide for and improve access to services to stabilize living situations and enhance quality of life, particularly for seniors, youth, and special needs populations

#### Community Development:

- CD1: improve infrastructure to foster accessible and livable neighborhoods and improve access to public amenities
- CD2: Develop or improve facilities that provide services to low-to moderate income residents and special needs populations
- CD3: Expand economic opportunities to low-to moderate income residents

All ten goals stem from key needs in our community. Currently, the El Paso County CDBG program has no intention of changing these program objectives or goals as they align to our 5-year Consolidated Plan. Adopting an adaptable approach to the El Paso County CDBG program considers the applicability of our objectives and how we might better address these objectives in a different approach. An example of this is when our volunteer board, the Community Development Advisory Board (CDAB), receives project updates in the fall. We use this opportunity to discuss our progress toward our 5-year goals and action steps to better address certain goals as needed.

#### **Narrative**

In 2022, El Paso County realigned its Consolidated Plan goals to better serve the needs of LMI residents. None of the 2022 CDBG-funded construction projects have broken ground. The resulting figures do not reflect returns on active projects. No Section 3 businesses were awarded federal funding by the El Paso County CDBG program during the 2022 year, and no Section 3 businesses applied for RFBs/RFPs. Since there are no businesses and contractors registered as Section 3 in the Colorado Springs metro area, we recognize one of our primary barriers to meeting Section 3 compliance is getting more contractors registered through SAM.gov. In response to this, El Paso County continues to offer free technical assistance to contractors registering on SAM.gov and for Section 3 status. CDBG staff also attends pre-bid meetings, when possible, to advertise the Section 3 program and how it can benefit contractors. We also distribute Section 3 brochures to contractors at each project to ensure they are aware of the potential opportunities associated with the certification. We strongly encourage all contractors to consider applying for eligibility.

To increase outreach to small businesses and contractors, CDBG staff maintain a strong working relationship with the Pikes Peak Small Business Development Center (SBDC) which has frequent, daily interaction with small and minority-owned businesses. Sharing information and contacts, as well as attending minority-focused events hosted by the SBDC, have been our primary methods of minority business outreach. The El Paso County CDBG program anticipates that future events hosted by the SBDC or the Colorado Springs Hispanic Business Council will offer more opportunities to share information, improve understanding of federally funded contracts and the corresponding expectations, and assist with attaining Federal/State certifications. Our program also maintains a working relationship with the Colorado Procurement Technical Assistance Center (PTAC), which helps businesses interested in working with the government. 





The person must have a record of having a disability. This step also protects people who previously have had a disability.

# **Understanding Disabilities**

- A disability may not be obvious
  - Heart Disease, Chronic Fatigue Syndrome, PTSD
- A disability does not necessarily need an assistive device
  - Walking Cane, Hearing Aid
- Recovering from addiction is considered a disability
- A person who is discriminated against because they are "perceived" to have a disability may still file a housing complaint, regardless of their actual disability status.

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# Be Reasonable!

## Reasonable Accommodation

 Policies or procedures are altered to accommodate a disability

#### Examples:

- Waiving a no pet policy
- Meeting a tenant in an accessible office
- Presenting property rules in simpler terms

## Reasonable Modification

 The property itself is modified to work with a disabled person's needs

## Examples:

- No-Slip grips on floors
- Automatic shut-off faucets
- Braille or color-coded signs
- Flashing light smoke alarms

# **Assistance Animals**

- Service Animals
  - Dogs who perform tasks related to a disability
  - There is no federal certification for service animals:
    - Your service animal must be trained to work for your benefit
    - You must have a documented disability that is aided by the service animal
    - Vests and ID Cards may look nice but are not required.



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# **Assistance Animals**

- Emotional Support Animals (ESA)
  - Any type of animal that provides therapeutic effect to alleviate mental impairment.
- Handlers are still required to pick up after their animals in common areas
- Animals must follow the rental property rules
  - i.e., can't be aggressive to other animals or people




